The governmental immunity act limitation of judgment amounts changed for incidents occurring on or after July 1, 2010. The limit for damages for personal injury against a governmental entity, or an employee who a governmental entity has a duty to indemnify, is \$648,700 for one person in an occurrence, \$2,221,700 aggregate for two or more persons in an occurrence, and \$259,500 for property damage for any one occurrence. These limits of judgment are adjusted every two years as required by UCA 63G-7-604(1). Associated rule R37-4 may be accessed at <http://www.rules.utah.gov/publicat/code/r037/r037-004.htm>
